Thomas Meyer

Born 1943 in Leipzig
Academic Career

- Studied Political Science, Philosophy and German Literature at Frankfurt/ University, Germany.
- PhD 1973 at Frankfurt University.
- Habilitation 1977 Freie University at Berlin.
- 1978-1994 Professor of Political Science (Political Theory) at University of Siegen.
- 1995-2009 Senior Professor of Political Science and Head of the Department of Political Science at the University of Dortmund.
- Director of several research projects by the DFG (most prestigious German Research Foundation). Fields of specialization in research and academic publication: Comparative Social Democracy, European Studies, Mass Media and Politics, Religious and Political Fundamentalism.
- Visiting Professor and guest lecturer at numerous universities, particularly in South-East and East Asia.
- Academic Advisor to the European Commission for Social Sciences and Humanities 2000-2007.
Member of the European Research Network of Excellence Garnet since 2004

Qin Yaqing

QIN Yaqing is President and Professor of China Foreign Affairs University (CFAU) and Chancellor of China Diplomatic Academy, Executive Vice-president of China National Association for International Studies (CNAIS) and editor-in-chief of Foreign Affairs Review, the academic journal of CFAU and CNAIS. He was on the resource team for the UN High Panel for Challenges, Threats and Changes (2003-04) and worked as Special Assistant to the Chinese Eminent Person, China-ASEAN Eminent Persons Group (2005).

Qin's main academic interest is International Relations (IR) theory and has recently focused on the exploration of Chinese cultural and philosophical traditions for developing IR theory. He has also done research on global and regional governance and China's foreign policy. As a leading scholar and professor in the field of international relations in China, Qin has published extensively, including Hegemonic System and International Conflicts; Power, Institutions and Culture; Relations and Process, etc.

He got his Ph. D. and M.A. in Political Science at University of Missouri-Columbia, USA.

Andrew Gamble

Andrew Gamble is Professor of Politics at the University of Sheffield and Emeritus Professor of Politics at the University of Cambridge. He is a Fellow of the British Academy and the Academy of Social Sciences, and a professorial Fellow at the Sheffield Political Economy Research Institute (SPERI). His most recent books are *Crisis without end? The unravelling of western prosperity* (2014) and *Can the welfare state survive?* (2016). He was a joint editor of *Political Quarterly* and *New Political Economy* for more than ten years and he has

published widely on political economy, British politics, and political theory. In 2005 he received the Isaiah Berlin Prize from the UK Political Studies Association for lifetime contribution to political studies. Dr Meyer holds an MA and PhD in Politics, an MSc in Financial Economics and an Executive MBA from different London universities. He is a specialist on European and global economic and political issues and an expert in strategy development, digital publishing and technology. Furthermore, Dr Meyer is a frequent commentator on political and economic issues on major news channels such as the CNBC, BBC News, Sky News, Al Jazeera International, ZDF, France 24 and SBS Australia as well as a regular contributor to newspapers and magazines such as The Guardian, DIE ZEIT, El Pais, Foreign Affairs and the New York Times

Balveer Arora

Balveer Arora is currently Professor Emeritus and Chairman, Centre for Multilevel Federalism, Institute of Social Sciences, New Delhi. He was earlier Professor of Political Science at Jawaharlal Nehru University (JNU), as also Rector and Pro-Vice Chancellor of the University. He was conferred the highest French civilian award of Knight in the National Order of the Legion of Honour (Legion d'honneur) in 2011. He is also an Officer in the French National Order of Academic Laurels (Palme Académique). Dr Arora obtained his Doctorate in Political Science from the University of Paris I (Pantheon-Sorbonne) after graduating from St Stephen's College, University of Delhi. He did his Masters and Doctoral studies at Sciences Po, Paris where he was subsequently a visiting professor. He has written extensively on India's federal democracy and its institutions, as also its party system and federal coalitions. His publications include *Indian Federalism: Origins and Development*; *Multiple Identities in a Single State*; *Transforming India*; *Changing Role of the All-India Services*. His recent works include "Diversity and Unity in the Indian Republic", "Indian Federalism: A Survey of Research" and "Political innovation in the working of Indian Democracy". Dr Arora has been on numerous scientific Committees and Boards in during his distinguished academic career, and visiting scholar in many prominent universities in India and abroad. He is currently Vice President of the Transcultural International Institute, Paris (Founder-President: Umberto Eco). His current research interests include political innovation and modernity in India's federal democracy.

Furio Cerutti

Furio Cerutti is Professor of Political Philosophy emeritus at the Università di Firenze and Adjunct Professor at the Scuola superiore S. Anna, Pisa. He has been a Visiting Scholar or Professor at Harvard, the Université de Paris 8, the Humboldt Universität zu Berlin, the London School of Economics and Political Science, 外交学院 (China Foreign Affairs University), Beijing and Stanford University in Florence. He is a member of Harvard Law School Alumni Association and a Research Alumnus of the University of Heidelberg. Between 2005 and 2010 he was a member of GARNET, a EU Network of excellence.

Lewis P.Hinchman

Lewis P. Hinchman was awarded his A.B. in Politics from Princeton University in 1968. After three semesters as a Fulbright scholar in Germany, he went on to do graduate work in the Government Department at Cornell University, from which he received his PhD in 1979. He taught for almost thirty years at Clarkson University's Humanities and Social Sciences Department (Potsdam, N.Y.) before retiring in 2009. Since then, he has taught every other year for the Semester at Sea program and acted as the English-language editor of and translator for the *International Quarterly: A Journal of Social Democracy*. Lew is the author/editor of three books in political theory, his area of expertise, and of numerous articles and book chapters on a variety of topics, from the rights of native peoples in America and Australia, to environmental political thought, and the battles over water and public lands in the American West, where he now lives.

Mario Teló

Mario Teló is Professor of International relations and “J. Monnet Chair”, Université Libre de Bruxelles and at the LUISS University, Rome. He is also Emeritus President of the Institute for European Studies (IEE, Brussels), was elected as a Member of The Royal Academy of Sciences in 2006.. He served as consultant for the EU Commission (2001-2006), the Presidency of the European Council (2000, 2007) as well as for the E.P. He published: *Europe. A Civilian Power?*, Palgrave, 2005; *European Union and New Regionalism*, (ed) Ashgate, 2001, 2007 and 2014) *International Relations. A European Perspective*, Foreword by R.O.Keohane, Ashgate 2009 (in French in 2008 and Mandarin in 2011), *The EU and global governance*, Routledge 2009 and *EU foreign policy*, 2013., *Politics of transatlantic trade negotiations*, Ashgate 2014, *Interregionalism and the EU*, Ashgate, 2014 Recently he published: *Regionalism in Hard Times*, Routledge, 2016. Visiting professor in many European, American (among them FGV) and East Asian Universities (CFAU, Wuhan, Fudan, Macao, Bandung, Hanoi, Chulalongkorn), he was Senior scholar of the global research networks GARNET (FP6) and GR:EEN (FP7) and still is coordinator of the Erasmus Mundus doctoral program GEM (“Globalization Europe multilateralism”), including universities of 5 continents and 65 PhD students, among them Chinese, Indians, Philipinos, Japanese, Brazilian, Zimbabwan, South African, US citizens. He takes part in the public debate about the future of the EU since many decades.

Xinning Song

Prof. Dr. Xinning Song is Jean Monnet Chair *ad personam* at Renmin University of China (RUC) in Beijing. He is Chairman of Academic Board of the Centre for European Studies at RUC, and Director of Institute of Comparative Regional Studies at Tsinghua University (Tsinghua-CRIS) since 2010. Currently, he is China Director of the Brussels Academy for China and European Studies (BACES), and China Director of Confucius Institute at Vrije Universiteit Brussel (VUB), Belgium. He also serves as Vice President of China Association of European Studies, Vice President of China Association of European Politics, Vice President of China Association of British Studies, and is a member of the Editorial/Advisory Board of a number of English academic journals in Europe. He was the Vice Chairman of



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International Politics Department and then Associate Dean of the School of International Studies at RUC from 1988-2005, Director of Centre for European Studies at RUC from 1994-2007, Senior Research Fellow at United Nations University Institute on Comparative Regional Integration Studies (UNU-CRIS) from 2007 to 2010.

His research interests include: international relations theory, international political economy, European Studies and comparative regional integration, Chinese foreign policy and EU-China relations. His recent publications include *The EU-China 40-Year Diplomatic Relationship: A New Type of Strategic Partnership*, Beijing: China University of Political Science and Law Press, 2017; *China-EU: Mutual Benefit, Strategic Partnership and Comprehensive Cooperation*, Beijing: China Intercontinental Press, 2016; *An Introduction to International Political Economy*, 2nd Edition, Renmin University of China Press, 2015; *China and Europe in Post-Crisis Era: Opportunities and Challenges*, Beijing: China University of Political Science and Law Press, 2014; *China and the European Union: The Future Direction*, Madrid: CEU Edicions, 2013.

C. K. Martin Chung

Martin Chung holds a PhD from the University of Hong Kong (2014) and a master's degree in European Studies from the University of Macau (2008). Previously, he was Research Assistant Professor of the European Union Academic Programme Hong Kong and a lecturer at the University of St. Joseph (Macau). His first monograph, *Repentance for the Holocaust: Lessons from Jewish Thought for Confronting the German Past* (Cornell University Press 2017) explores the role of religious ideas in German *Vergangenheitsbewältigung* (coming to terms with the past). In *Reconciling with the Past: Resources and Obstacles in a Global Perspective* (Routledge 2017, co-edited with Annika Frieberg), he analyses the idea of apology in Chinese classics and the problem of its application in East Asian politics at present. At HKBU, he teaches the general education course “The World of Contemporary Europe” and major elective courses including “Contemporary Europe and Asia”, “Government and Politics of the United Kingdom”, and “Political Philosophy: Chinese and European”.

Chung is a recipient of the Asia-Europe Comparative Studies Research Project Grant 2014 by the Institute of European Studies of Macau with his project on Sino-European comparative cultures of remembrance, out of which a peer-reviewed article, “Chinesische *Vergangenheitsbewältigung*: Hindernisse und Ressourcen in vergleichender Perspektive” [Chinese coming to terms with the past: Obstacles and resources in comparative], was published in the *Jahrbuch für Politik und Geschichte* 2015, Vol. 6, pp. 115-133 (Franz Steiner Verlag). He has also had active roles in several Model EU simulation exercises in Hong Kong, Macau and Tokyo.

Renato Flores

Renato G. Flôres Jr. is Director of the International Intelligence Unit (IIU), at FGV (Brazil), where he is also Professor at the Graduate School of Economics and Special Aide to the President. A member of the IISS, London, and of the Lisbon Academy of Sciences, he seats at the board of several research centres and think tanks involved in international relations, and at the Enlarged Board of one multinational bank. He also served as a Brazilian expert at the WTO. A specialist in global political economy, with a vast list of academic and less-specialised contributions, Professor Flôres has significantly contributed to the international, particularly Asian dimension of FGV activities.
