Speakers' info

José Luís de Sales Marques

José Luís de Sales Marques has been President of the Board of Directors of the Institute of European Studies, Macau (IEEM) since January of 2002. From 1993–2001, he served as the Mayor of Macau. His research, teaching, and writing focus on Asia–Europe relations, EU–China dialogue, regional integration, and urban studies.

Maria João Rodrigues

Maria João Rodrigues, former Portuguese Minister of Employment in Portugal of PM Antonio Guterres is a European politician with a long track in all European institutions: EU Presidencies, Council, European Council, European Commission and, more recently, European Parliament.

She is currently President of the European Foundation for Progressive Studies (FEPS), the European progressive think tank. Between 2014 and 2019 she was Member of the European Parliament (MEP) and S&D Vice-President of the S&D Group, the second most important EP Group.

Throughout her work, she helped delivering important outcomes in areas such as: the Lisbon Strategy and the EU 2020 Strategy; the EU agenda for globalization and the strategic partnerships with the USA, China, Russia, India and Brazil; the new phase of Erasmus programme; New Skills for New Jobs; the European Pillar of Social Rights; and the response to the Eurozone crisis. More recently, she contributed to the EU Roadmap and the Commission Work Programme.

Gerhard Stahl

Gerhard Stahl is Visiting Professor at the Peking University HSBC Business School in Shenzhen in China and was Professor at the College of Europe in the Economic Department.

He started his professional career at the German Ministry of Finance. He worked in leading positions in the European Parliament and in the European Commission. Gerhard Stahl was Secretary-General of the European Committee of the Regions for more than ten years.

He has a long list of publications on economic policy, regional policy, European and international policy issues.

Andrew Gamble

Andrew Gamble is Professor of Politics at the University of Sheffield and Emeritus Professor of Politics at the University of Cambridge. He is a Fellow of the British Academy and the Academy of Social Sciences, and a professorial Fellow at the Sheffield Political Economy Research Institute (SPERI). He has recently published two collections of essays The Western Ideology and other essays (2021) and After Brexit and other Essays (2021). He was a joint editor of Political Quarterly and New Political Economy for more than ten years and he has published widely on political economy, British politics, and political theory. In 2005 he received the Isaiah Berlin Prize from the UK Political Studies Association for lifetime contribution to political studies.

Thomas Meyer

Thomas Meyer is Emeritus Professor of Political Science at the Technical University of Dortmund and Co-Editor-in-Chief of the monthly political magazine, Neue Gesellschaft/Frankfurter Hefte. He received his Dr.degree in Philosophie and Political Science from the Frankfurt University and his Dr. phil. Habil. from the Free University Berlin. He has held visiting professor and guest lecturer positions at numerous universities, particularly in East and Southeast Asia, including Todai University, Tokyo; Beida University, Beijing; and the Indian Institute of Management, Bangalore, India. He directed projects for the prestigious German Research Foundation (DFG) on such topics as political communication and the media (1995-2001), and the theory and practice of social democracy (2002-06). In the 1980ies he was an advisor to Willy Brandt. From 2000-07 he served as Academic Advisor to the European Commission for the Social Sciences and Humanities, and from 2004-08 he was a member of the GARNET Network of Excellence, funded by the European Commission. Professor Meyer's research focuses on the Cultural Foundations and Politics, comparative social democracy, European studies, mass media and politics, the political role of Civilizations, and religious and political fundamentalism. From 2016 – 2020 he directed in cooperation with Prof. Mario Telò and José Luis Marques an international research project on Multiple Modernities and Good Governance at the Macao Institute of European Studies the results of which have been published in 4 edited Volumes at Routlege Publishers.yyy Among his many books are The Theory of Social Democracy (Polity Press, 2007), Identity Mania. Ummu Salma Bava

Prof. Dr Ummu Salma Bava is Professor of European Studies and Jean Monnet Chair, Centre for European Studies at Jawaharlal Nehru University. With over 35 years of teaching and research experience, she is one of the leading Indian experts on EU, German, Indian foreign and security policy, regional integration, emerging powers, norms and global governance and Peace and conflict resolution. She has numerous publications and is part of the SCRIPTS Project at FU Berlin Germany. She has been Visiting Professor at University of Würzburg, Leipzig, ULB, Brussels. She has also been conferred the prestigious Order of Merit (Bundesverdienstkreuz) by the President of the Federal Republic of Germany (2012). She was a Board Member on the Research Advisory Council, Stiftung Wissenschaft und Politik, Berlin and Academic Advisory Board, German Institute of Global and Area Studies, Hamburg and speaks fluent German.



Hu Weixing

Richard Weixing Hu is UM Development Foundation Distinguished Professor and Dean of Faculty of Social Sciences at University of Macau (UMac). Before joining UMac, he was Professor and Head, Department of Politics and Public Administration at University of Hong Kong, where he taught for 22 years. Professor Hu completed his undergraduate education at Peking University and received a Bachelor of Law (international politics) in 1983. He went to the U.S. for postgraduate studies and received an MA in international relations from Johns Hopkins SAIS in 1987. He got his Ph.D. degree in political science from University of Maryland, College Park in 1992. He was a John M. Olin Fellow in National Security Studies at Harvard University, an IGCC Postdoc Fellow at University of California at San Diego, and a CNAPS Fellow at Brookings Institution. He has published six books and over 100 journal articles and book chapters. His latest book was a coauthored book entitled *Contesting Revisionism: China, the United States, and the Transformation of International Order* (Oxford University Press, 2021)

Amitav Acharya

Amitav Acharya is the UNESCO Chair in Transnational Challenges and Governance and Distinguished Professor at the School of International Service, American University, Washington, DC. Previously he was a Professor at York University, Toronto and the University of Bristol, U.K. He is currently Honorary Professor at Rhodes University, South Africa, Guest Professor at Nankai University, China, and Distinguished Professor (Visiting) at Ewha Womans University, South Korea. He was the inaugural Boeing Company Chair in International Relations at the Schwarzman Scholars Program at Tsinghua University, Fellow of Harvard's Asia Center and John F. Kennedy School of Government, and Christensen Fellow at Oxford. His books include Reimagining International Relations (Cambridge 2022, with Barry Buzan), The Making of Global International Relations (Cambridge 2019: with Barry Buzan); Constructing Global Order (Cambridge 2018); The End of American World Order (Polity 2014, 2018); Why Govern? Rethinking Demand and Progress in Global Governance (editor, Cambridge 2016); The Making of Southeast Asia (Cornell 2013); and Whose Ideas Matter (Cornell 2009). His essays have appeared in International Organization, International Security, International Studies Quarterly, Journal of Asian Studies, Foreign Affairs, Journal of Peace Research, International Affairs, Perspectives on Politics, and World Politics. He has written op-eds for Financial Times, International Herald Tribune (now International New York Times) Washington Post, Times of India, Australian Financial Review, and other newspapers around the world, and appeared on news media such as CNN International, BBC TV and BBC World Service Radio. He is the first non-Western scholar to be elected (for 2014-15) the President of the International Studies Association (ISA), the largest and most influential global network in international studies. He has received three ISA Distinguished Scholar Awards: in 2015 for his "contribution to non-Western IR theory and inclusion" in international studies, in 2018 for his "influence, intellectual works and mentorship" in the field of international organization; and in 2023 for his "extraordinary impact" in globalizing the study of International Relations and "mentorship of emerging scholars". He is also a recipient of American University's highest honor: Scholar-Teacher of the Year Award (2020).
