The rationale of the Macau 4 conference

At the beginning of the 21st century, multilateral and peaceful cooperation among diverse states, regions and cultures is at stake. The legacy of the hegemonic era is declining, not only because of the legitimacy and efficiency deficits, but also of the open boycotting of relevant members. However, in spite of defections and attacks, the institutionalization of international life shows resilience and sometimes progresses: new forms of cultural dialogue as well as of pluralist, multilayered multilateral cooperation are emerging at global, regional and interregional levels; they are focusing on traditional challenges and the new relevant common goods of the human kind. Cultural backgrounds, cognitive priorities very much matter in conditioning intercultural dialogues and convergence.

Taking stock of the progresses achieved by the previous three conferences (2016,2017,2018, the first is already published, the second in forthcoming; the third is at state of publication proposal) we will implement on November 2nd 2019 the recommendation of the Macau 3 (2018) concluding debate by including in our research agenda concrete policy-fields.

The most relevant of them, both culturally and politically, are the following-ones:

-two major threats to the human kind survival : **climate change/environmental protection**, on the one hand and **ABC weapon proliferation/security**, two challenges going far beyond the powers of single, even powerful, national Leviathan and demanding multilateral cooperation. Furthermore, they are multi-actors issues, where regions, participatory networks matter as driving forces. The COP regime evolution and the UN system are the multilateral arrangements/organizations addressed.

- **international trade** . While trade used to be the driver of interdependence and growth, it is now under threat of trade wars on the one hand, and , on the other, the target of demands of enhanced criteria and values concerning environmental, social and life standards of the citizens . There is an evident link between trade- regime-upgrading and conflict preventing; as well as between trade wars and security implications. The organization addressed is WTO but this issue goes beyond WTO.

- the fourth dimension of multilateral cooperation we propose to discuss is the controversial question of human rights protection **at the cross-road between universalism (UNdeclaration) and relativism**. The conceptual and philosophical sides must be combined

with the analysis of the various background cultures and cognitive priors, legal definitions and alternative ways of governance at regional and multilateral levels.

The method:

- a) A bottom up approach is proposed: starting with policy-analysis and concluded by the dialogue about the very conceptual, institutional, normative and political dimension of a new multilateral cooperation.
- b) By the program construction and implementation we should take stock of the experience and underline the Macau role as bridge-maker in a period where the Cold War approach is affecting policies and ideas: the inter- cultural balance between Western and Eastern participation is essential, notably between the European and Chinese/East Asian participants; secondly respecting gender balance is an imperative for the Macau conferences.
- c) we do wish a sustained dialogue between academics , cultural Foundations and intellectuals committed to the various policy making communities; openness to cooperation with the Gulbenkian Foundation and FEPS (and other entities) are consistent with these shared aims. We would also very much like to ask, at least, for a written message by the UN general secretary Antonio Guterres (to be requested in June and put in the invitation letter as well as in the final program)

José Luís de Sales Marques

José Luís de Sales Marques has been President of the Board of Directors of the Institute of European Studies, Macau (IEEM) since January of 2002. From 1993–2001, he served as the Mayor of Macau. His research, teaching, and writing focus on Asia–Europe relations, EU–China dialogue, regional integration, and urban studies.

Qin Yaqing

QIN Yaqing is Professor of China Foreign Affairs University (CFAU) and Chancellor of China Diplomatic Academy, Executive Vice-president of China National Association for International Studies (CNAIS) and editor-in-chief of Foreign Affairs Review, the academic journal of CFAU and CNAIS. He was on the resource team for the UN High Panel for Challenges, Threats and Changes (2003-04) and worked as Special Assistant to the Chinese Eminent Person, China-ASEAN Eminent Persons Group (2005).

Qin's main academic interest is International Relations (IR) theory and has recently focused on the exploration of Chinese cultural and philosophical traditions for developing IR theory. He has also done research on global and regional governance and China's foreign policy. As a leading scholar and professor in the field of international relations in China, Qin has published extensively, including Hegemonic System and International Conflicts; Power, Institutions and Culture; Relations and Process, etc.

He got his Ph. D. and M.A. in Political Science at University of Missouri-Columbia, USA.

He is the author of A relations theory of world politics, Cambridge University press 2017

Maria João Rodrigues

Maria João Rodrigues, former Portuguese Minister of Employment in Portugal of PM Antonio Guterres is a European politician with a long track in all European institutions: EU Presidencies, Council, European Council, European Commission and, more recently, European Parliament.

She is currently President of the European Foundation for Progressive Studies (FEPS), the European progressive think tank. Between 2014 and 2019 she was Member of the European Parliament (MEP) and S&D Vice-President of the S&D Group, the second most important EP Group.

Throughout her work, she helped delivering important outcomes in areas such as: the Lisbon Strategy and the EU 2020 Strategy; the EU agenda for globalization and the strategic partnerships with the USA, China, Russia, India and Brazil; the new phase of Erasmus programme; New Skills for New Jobs; the European Pillar of Social Rights; and the response to the Eurozone crisis. More recently, she contributed to the EU Roadmap and the Commission Work Programme.

Mario Teló

Mario Teló is Professor of International relations and “J. Monnet Chair”, Université Libre de Bruxelles and at the LUISS University, Rome. He is also Emeritus President of the Institute for European Studies (IEE, Brussels), was elected as a Member of The Royal Academy of Sciences in 2006.. He served as consultant for the EU Commission (2001-2006), the Presidency of the European Council (2000, 2007) as well as for the E.P. He published: *Europe. A Civilian Power?*, Palgrave, 2005; *European Union and New Regionalism*, (ed) Ashgate, 2001, 2007 and 2014) *International Relations. A European Perspective*, Foreword by R.O.Keohane, Ashgate 2009 (in French in 2008 and Mandarin in 2011), *The EU and global governance*, Routledge 2009 and *EU foreign policy*, 2013., *Politics of transatlantic trade negotiations*, Ashgate 2014, *Interregionalism and the EU*, Ashgate, 2014 Recently he published: *Regionalism in Hard Times*, Routledge, 2016. Editor of the forthcoming book: *Supranationalism at stake*, with preface of P.Lamy, Routledge 2019. Visiting professor in many European, American (among them FGV) and East Asian Universities (CFAU, Wuhan, Fudan, Macao, Bandung, Hanoi, Chulalongkorn), he was Senior scholar of the global research networks GARNET (FP6) and GR:EEEN (FP7) and still is coordinator of the Erasmus Mundus doctoral program GEM (“Globalization Europe multilateralism”), including universities of 5 continents and 65 PhD students. He takes part in the public debate about the future of the EU since many decades.

Ye Qi

Ye Qi is Professor of Public Policy and Director of Institute of Public Policy at Hong Kong University Science and Technology, the Cheung Kong Professor of Environmental Policy and Management at Tsinghua University's School of Public Policy and Management, and the Volkswagen Professor of Sustainability at Schwarzman College. From April 2014 to January 2019, he was Senior Fellow at the Brookings Institution and the Director of Brookings-Tsinghua Center for Public Policy. He was appointed as Cheung Kong Professor of Environmental Science at Beijing Normal University from 2002-2005. Before returning to China in 2003, he taught ecosystem management and climate change science at the Department of Environmental Science, Policy and Management at University of California, Berkeley from 1996 through 2003. Ye Qi received his Ph.D. in Environmental Science in 1994 jointly awarded by the State University of New York College of Environmental Science and Forestry and Syracuse University.

Ye's research areas include the governance and policy of the environment, energy, climate change and urbanization. His current research focuses on the energy transition and low-carbon development in a rapidly urbanizing world. He led China's first low-carbon development plan for the city of Baoding. He has been leading the research and writing of the Annual Review of Low-Carbon Development in China since 2010, among the seven published reports, two volumes were translated into English and published by international presses. He has published 136 papers in key peer-reviewed journals, 14 edited books; 36 book chapters and monographs, 27 articles published on newspapers, think tank outlets and other magazines.

Coraline Goron

Coraline Goron is Assistant Professor of Environmental Policy at Duke Kunshan University. In 2017, she obtained a double PhD Degree in Politics from the University of Warwick (UK) and the Université Libre de Bruxelles (Belgium) under the European Erasmus Mundus Program on Globalization, the EU and Multilateralism. In March 2018, her PhD dissertation entitled "Climate Revolution or Long March, The Politics of Low-Carbon Transformation in China, The Case of the Power Sector" was awarded the Marthe Engelborghs-Bertels for Sinology. Before coming to DKU, in 2018-2019 she did a postdoc at the Oxford University China Center. Coraline's research interests cover China's domestic politics of environment, climate change and energy, as well as China's increasing role in the global governance of environmental issues. Her most recent publications include "Ecological Civilization and the Political Limits of a Chinese Concept of Sustainability" in *China Perspective*, 2018/4."

Deborah Seligsohn

Deborah Seligsohn is an Assistant Professor of Political Science at Villanova University. Her research focuses on Chinese politics, US-China relations and energy and environmental politics in China and India. Prior to receiving her PhD in Political Science and International Affairs from the University of California San Diego in 2018 she worked in both the NGO and government sectors on energy, climate and the environment. From 2007 to 2012 she was based in Beijing as the Principal Advisor to the World Resources Institute's China Energy and Climate Program. She also had over 20 years'

experience in the United States Department of State, working on energy and environment issues in China, India, Nepal and New Zealand. Her most recent position was as Environment, Science, Technology and Health Counselor in Beijing, 2003-2007.

Renato G. Flôres Jr

Professor Renato Flôres is Director, FGV International Intelligence Unit, a small think tank directly linked to the President of Fundação Getulio Vargas, Rio de Janeiro, Brazil. Trained as a mathematician and economist, after a few decades working in economic modelling, particularly in international trade and regional integrations applications, he moved to a broader view of international political economy, incorporating geopolitical and international relations theory contributions. He is a specialist on Asia (particularly India and Southeast Asia) and the BRICS, working also on the future trends of core planetary issues as global governance, peace and the nuclear game, sustainability and the distribution of opportunities. His previous experience on the European and South American integration experiments is a relevant source for comparisons and examples. Professor Flôres is an internationally recognised outstanding teacher, having lectured in several universities in Europe, Latin America and Asia, and has more than 100 papers published in books and peer-reviewed journals on the subjects of his interest. With former PhD student Gustavo de Athayde, he is the author of an original extension of portfolio choice theory that opened up a new, booming line of research in this field. Finally, he holds a concern on the economics of art, having acted as a UNESCO consultant on cultural diversity issues.

Ding Chun

Prof. Dr. Chun DING is a professor in School of Economics and Director of the Centre for European Studies, Fudan University. He is also Vice President of Chinese Association of European Studies. Internationally, he is a Jean Monnet Chair of the EU, president of the European Union Studies Association Asia-Pacific (2018-2019), Robert-Schumann Professorship of Luxemburg University, Senior Fellow of ZEI, University of Bonn, Member of International Academic Board at Centre for European Research at University of Gothenburg, and has been a member of the (Davos) World Economic Forum's GAC on Europe. He is specialized in research and teaching of European integration, European economy, China-EU relations and social welfare issues etc. He has published more than 140 relevant articles and works in Chinese, English and German.

Zhang Xiaotong

Dr. Zhang Xiaotong is professor of the School of Political Science and Public Administration, Wuhan University, a Member of Advisory Committee for Economic and Trade Policy (Economic Diplomacy Subcommittee) of the Chinese Ministry of Commerce and Executive Director of Wuhan University Centre for Economic Diplomacy and. He used to work at the U.S. Desk of Chinese Ministry of Commerce, and serve as Trade Attaché at the Chinese Mission to the European Union in Brussels between 2004 and 2010. He obtained a Ph.D. degree on political science at Université Libre de Bruxelles (ULB) in Belgium. He published Brussels Diary, a biography about his working experiences as a trade diplomat, and China's Economic Diplomacy in the 21st Century, an edited volume on China's economic diplomacy in the first ten years of the 21st century. Dr. Zhang was a visiting scholar at SAIS, Johns Hopkins University in 2014-2015. His major research interests include economic diplomacy, geopolitics, and European studies.

Xinning Song

Prof. Dr. Xinning Song is Jean Monnet Chair *ad personam* at Renmin University of China (RUC) in Beijing. He is Chairman of Academic Board of the Centre for European Studies at RUC, and Director of Institute of Comparative Regional Studies at Tsinghua University (Tsinghua-CRIS) since 2010. Currently, he is China Chair of Academic Board of the Brussels Academy for China and European Studies (BACES). He also serves as Vice President of China Association of European Studies, Vice President of China Society of European Politics, Vice President of China Society of British Studies, and is a member of the Editorial/Advisory Board of a number of English academic journals in Europe. He was the Vice Chairman of International Politics Department and then Associate Dean of the School of International Studies at RUC from 1988-2005, Director of Centre for European Studies at RUC from 1994-2007, Senior Research Fellow at United Nations University Institute on Comparative Regional Integration Studies (UNU-CRIS) from 2007 to 2010 and China Director of Confucius Institute at Vrije Universiteit Brussel (VUB) in Belgium from April 2016 to July 2019.

His research interests include: international relations theory, international political economy, European Studies and comparative regional integration, Chinese foreign policy and EU-China relations. His recent publications include *An Introduction to International Political Economy, 3rd Edition*, Beijing: Renmin University of China Press, 2019, *The EU-China 40-Year Diplomatic Relationship: A New Type of Strategic Partnership*, Beijing: China University of Political Science and Law Press, 2017; *China-EU: Mutual Benefit, Strategic Partnership and Comprehensive Cooperation*, Beijing: China Intercontinental Press, 2016; *An Introduction to International Political Economy, 2nd Edition*, Renmin University of China Press, 2015; *China and Europe in Post-Crisis Era: Opportunities and Challenges*, Beijing: China University of Political Science and Law Press, 2014; *China and the European Union: The Future Direction*, Madrid: CEU Edicions, 2013.

Nuno Severiano Teixeira

He has served as Minister of Defense (2006/2009) and Minister of Interior (2000/2002) of the Portuguese Government. He is currently Full Professor of International Relations at NOVA University- Lisbon and the Director of the Portuguese Institute of International Relations (IPRI-NOVA). He has recently been Visiting Professor at Georgetown University (2017/2019). He was Scholar at the Institute for European studies, University of California, Berkeley (2004), and Senior *Visiting Scholar* at the Robert Schuman Centre for Advanced Studies European University Institute – Florence (2010). He was Vice Rector of NOVA University-Lisbon and Director of the National Defense Institute (1996-2000). He has published extensively on History of International Relations and History of European integration, Military History, Security and Defense Studies.

Michael Zürn

Prof. Dr. Michael Zürn is director of the research unit Global Governance at WZB Berlin Social Science Center and professor of International Relations at the Free University of Berlin. Since 2019, he is the spokesperson of the Cluster of Excellence Contestations of the Liberal Script (SCRIPTS), funded by the German Research Foundation. He was the founding rector of the Hertie School of Governance and director of the Special Research Center on “Transformations of Statehood” at the University of Bremen. He is member of the Academia Europaea and the Berlin-Brandenburg Academy of Sciences as well as of numerous editorial and advisory boards and has been a guest at several universities such as Harvard University and the London School of Economics. His main research focus is the emergence and functioning of inter- and supranational institutions and the normative tensions and political conflicts that these developments unfold.

Eun-Jeung Lee

Prof. Dr. Eun-Jeung Lee is since 2008 professor at the FU Berlin, Director of the Institute of Korean Studies, Vice Director of Graduate School of East Asian Studies. She is a member of Academy of Science and Humanity in Berlin-Brandenburg (f. Prussian Academy of Art and Science), and Academia Europaea. 2014 she has been nominated as a member of the German-Korean Advisory Body for Foreign Policy Aspects of Unification. She has received the Mirok Lee Price in 2013. She studied at the Ewha University, Korea and the University of Göttingen. She finished her “Habilitation” in 2001 at the University of Halle, Germany. She taught at Universities in Korea, Japan and Germany. She has edited several books and published nine monographs and more than 100 papers, including *Sōwōn, die konfuzianischen Privatakademien in Korea* (Frankfurt a.M. 2016), *Ostasien denken* (Baden-Baden 2014), *Korea im demokratischen Aufschwung* (Leipzig 2005) “Anti-Europa”. *Die Geschichte der Rezeption des Konfuzianismus und der konfuzianischen Gesellschaft seit der frühen Aufklärung* (Münster 2003) and *Konfuzianismus und Kapitalismus* (Münster 1997).

André Gerrits

André Gerrits is affiliated with the Institute for History at Leiden University. He is full professor of International Studies and Global Politics, and Chair of the Urban Studies programme. Previously, he held the chair in Russian History and Politics at Leiden University and the Jean Monnet Chair in European Studies at the University of Amsterdam. Gerrits was also a Senior Research Fellow at the Netherlands Institute of International Studies Clingendael.

Winner of Sun Yefang Award of Economic Sciences, 2011, China Green Person of the Year 2010/2011. China Environment Prize (2016).

Zhou Hong

Professor Dr. Zhou Hong holds Ph.D. in comparative history and Bachelor in German Studies. She was the former Director General of the Institute of European Studies until 2014. She is now the Deputy Director of the CASS Academic Division for International Studies, President of the Chinese Association for European Studies, Director of the Center of International Development and Cooperation and Welfare Promotion, Board Member of the China Economic and Social Council, Board Member of the Chinese People's Institute of Foreign Affairs, and a deputy to the 12th and 13th National Congress of PRC.

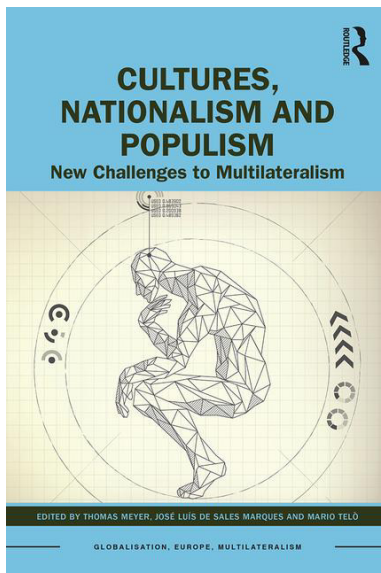
